the President's Report

GREETINGS FRIENDS!

The numbers are quite disturbing. The Minnesota DNR reports that participation in many core outdoor activities, mirroring a national trend, has declined dramatically. In the decade between 1996 and 2006, MN fishing license sales went down 15%; hunting licenses down 9%; MN state park visits down 10%; use of the Boundary Waters Canoe Area by Minnesota residents down 27%; boating, use of state trails, wildlife watching and wilderness use – all down.

According to the DNR, the major factor driving this trend is a decline in participation in outdoor recreational activities by young adults (between 20-40 years old) and their children. Major causes for these drops include the Internet, video games, cable-television and other sedentary, indoor activities. As 'baby-boomers' and their parents age, it appears that this unfortunate trend will continue.

This decline in outdoor recreation participation has many troubling and far-flung consequences. 60% of Minnesota's population is obese, and we suffer from high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes and the threat of shorter life-spans. Perhaps the worst result, though, is the loss of connections to the wilderness and concern for nature. One has to wonder if future generations will share in our love and willingness to preserve nature. If it were proposed today to set aside 30,000 acres in Sherburne County for a wildlife refuge that

would displace over 300 individual landowners; would it pass? I have my doubts.

So, what can we do to try to counter and, perhaps, even reverse this trend? As an organization, the Friends of Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge (SNWR) will expand its mission of education and advocacy. We will continue our participation in community expos and chambers of commerce to "get the word out" about SNWR. We will continue sponsoring family-friendly activities at the refuge, such as the fall and winter festivals, Wildlife Film Festival, bird tours, etc. We will also increase our efforts to engage area school children by providing transportation support, teacher workshops and education opportunities to area schools and teachers.

I would also suggest that you, as individuals who have demonstrated your commitment and dedication to the refuge, never miss an opportunity to share your love of SNWR with others. Take your children and grandchildren for outings at the refuge. Get them outside as much as possible! Share your wonder and knowledge of the outdoors with them. In the end, passing on and instilling an appreciation for nature may be the best possible legacy we can leave to our children and future generations.

Good news! Life just got simpler for members, donors, and our Treasurer! The Friends of Sherburne are now able to collect dues and donations via the internet through an organization called **GiveMN**. Just think - no more scurrying around for checkbook, pen, envelope, and a stamp. No need to postpone paying dues or donating because those items aren't handy. And now the Friends are all ready for this year's **Give to the Max Day on Tuesday, Nov. 16**. Last year, \$14 million was raised in ONE DAY for Minnesota nonprofits via the **GiveMN.org** website!

To pay/donate go to <http://GiveMN.razoo.com/>. Type Friends of Sherburne into the box labeled "Find a nonprofit" and click on the search symbol at the end of the box.

The next screen will be a page with information about the refuge and the Friends plus a list of donation categories. Enter an amount into the box for the category of your choice and press the "DONATE" button. You will then be taken to a secure, encrypted website where you can complete the details of your payment.

This service to Minnesota nonprofits was initially funded by a group of Minnesota companies. For now US Bank has committed to subsidizing operations so there is no fee deducted from donations made through **GiveMN.org**. Participating non-profit groups will get the full amount from all donations. **GiveMN.org** is seeking grants and donations so this can continue, but even if they eventually have to charge, it will be only 3% to cover the credit card processing fees.

Discovery Center Without Walls – School Days, School Days

“School” was in session at the refuge this summer! In our last issue you read about the June teacher workshop, *Using Sherburne Refuge as an Outdoor Classroom*. Exploration and environmental education continued in August as 17 refuge volunteers and a teacher from the northwestern suburbs of the Cities spent a day in a special environmental education workshop – *Leading Discovery, Finding Wonder*.

David Ellis, Instructional Systems Specialist for the Fish and Wildlife Service at Prairie Wetlands Learning Center, was once again the facilitator. He skillfully led the group to use a “compass model” to organize our approach to environmental education and interpretation. The “compass points” in this approach are

- (1) Study Phenology,
- (2) Use Place-Based Learning,
- (3) Use a Nature Journal, and
- (4) Study Naturalists.

The group enjoyed exploring water samples for aquatic invertebrates, becoming a part of nature during a “Seton Watch,” drawing a “Sound and Color Map,” and seeing what all we could find outside during a “Bio-Blitz.”

As the teacher workshop before it, the volunteer workshop received rave reviews:

- “I liked learning that I don’t have to know everything – a main goal is to facilitate discovery in others!”
- “It was helpful to have the compass as a framework for organizing my approach to interpretation.”
- “It was lots of fun and I learned more about myself, others, and the refuge.”

- “Fabulous,” “A+,” “A++,” “10 out of 10” – you get the idea.

As more and more schools are learning about the refuge and teachers call to arrange visits for their students, more and more environmental education volunteers will be needed. It is gratifying to see new people as well as experienced folks – including 8 of the 12 Friends board members – step up to meet the need.

A second teacher workshop will be offered on Thursday, October 21. Funding from the Friends and support of the Fish and Wildlife Service allow area teachers to participate free of charge. Interested teachers may contact me at slhix@q.com. If transportation expense is a barrier to a student group’s refuge visit, the Friends may be able to assist. Around the refuge with the DNR

- Grids of small red flags on the refuge mark areas where the MN DNR is studying the western hognose snake. The study, within the savannas of the Anoka Sand Plain, uses radio telemetry tracking to glean a better understanding of how this rare species uses the landscape.
- Well drilling equipment at the entrance to the designated fishing site on County Road 1 signaled the drilling of a 200 foot deep well by the MN DNR. This is one of a series of wells to monitor deep aquifer water quality and quantity. The refuge is already home to a series of 25 wells for the monitoring of shallow water quality and quantity.
- Biology Technician Sally Zodrow captured, banded, and released 25 mourning doves as part of a MN DNR study of mourning dove population stability. This is the first year of a continuing project on the refuge.

NEW STAFF at the REFUGE

Betsy Beneke is Sherburne's new Visitor Services Manager, following Nancy Haugen's retirement. She has worked for the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service for 26 years in both biology and visitor services programs. Betsy began her career on the Upper Mississippi River Refuge in Winona, MN then went on to Seney Refuge in Michigan, Tamarac Refuge in northwestern Minnesota, and before Sherburne, was in northern Utah at Bear River Migratory Bird Refuge. While in Utah, Betsy was part of the team that worked on construction of their new wildlife education center. She's excited about the prospect of building a new visitor center at Sherburne - hoping that her experiences at Bear River will be useful in our project. Betsy is a Minnesota girl, having grown up on a farm east of Hinckley. She's thrilled to be back "home" in Minnesota and says, "Being part of the Sherburne team is just icing on the cake. There are so many friendly, dedicated people here - staff, volunteers and Friends. I'm very happy to be here!"

Beth Watson joined the staff as the Volunteer Coordinator in mid April. She resides in Milaca with her two children. Her experience includes working for Community Education in Milaca and Elk River School districts and being a Volunteer Coordinator at a nursing care and rehabilitation facility in Milaca. With her degree in Outdoor Recreation Management and a minor in Environmental Science, Beth brings her knowledge and love for the outdoors to the refuge and the volunteer program. When asked what she likes most at Sherburne she stated, "Absolutely the professionalism of the volunteers, they are amazing! And of course the scenery out my office window."

"The Big Sit"

Join us on Sunday, October 10. Continue Sherburne's celebration of Refuge Week by joining our team, the "Sherburne Savanna Sitters." The Big Sit is like a tailgate party for birders. We'll be counting birds all day from a 17 ft. diameter circle, and then submitting our results to the national database at the end of the day. It's FUN and FREE! Participants should bring a chair, food, beverages, binoculars or scope, and appropriate clothing. We'll have some fun watching birds from our "circle" located at the Oak Savanna Trail parking area at the beginning of the Prairie's Edge Wildlife Drive. You can spend the day, an hour or two, or just a few minutes - it's up to you! Team members will be counting birds during daylight hours. Scott Pariseau, a new full time Law Enforcement Officer, joined the refuge staff this summer. A few years ago the Fish and Wildlife Service requested a review of its Law Enforcement program. The review was conducted by the International Association of Police Chiefs (IAPC), the world's oldest and largest association of police executives. The IAPC review identified many changes that would benefit the Fish and Wildlife Service. One of them was placing more full time officers at field stations and one of those stations was Sherburne Refuge. Officer Pariseau's regular duties will include not only Sherburne but also Crane Meadows and Rice Lake NWR. He will also work with other officers in USFWS Region 3 on special emphasis issues and incidents.

Elizabeth Roberts recently joined the staff as the Administrative Officer for the Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge. Elizabeth has been with the Department of the Interior for two and a half years. Her previous position was with the USFWS Migratory Bird Permit Office. Regarding her new position Elizabeth says, "My family and I have lived in the Orrock/Zimmerman area for several years and have always enjoyed our outings on the refuge (I can remember back to the days when only a dirt road led to refuge headquarters). I feel privileged to be able to work in such beautiful surroundings and I'm looking forward to my future here at the Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge."

Volunteers will meet at the Old School House 5.5 miles west of Highway 169 on Sherburne County Road 9.
